1 Shock Value

Boldness and theatrical grandeur were the hallmarks of Dorothy Draper, the society decorator whose striking interiors still look fresh today. She's the subject of a new monograph, *In the Pink* (Pointed Leaf Press, \$95), and her most celebrated projects, including the restaurant for New York's Metropolitan Museum, 1954, above, are surveyed in a show from May 2 to August 27 at the Museum of the City of New York. 2 Graphic Nature

His obsession with flowers led Austria's 18th-century emperor Francis I to commission luscious, life-size botanical illustrations, which are stunningly reproduced in Florilegium Imperiale (Prestel, \$165). The World of Ornament (Taschen, \$200) is a sumptuous reprint of a late-19th-century compilation of patterns ranging from antiquity to Victorian florals.

3 Seeing Redd

Napa Valley's prettiest new dining room is the 90-seat Redd in Yountville. Asfour Guzy, a New York architectural firm, has created a polished, woodsy setting for chef Richard Reddington's haute comfort food (lobster risotto, pork belly with fennel puree). At 6480 Washington St.; call 707-944-2222.
